

Emergency Food Relief Program Empowers 2,000 Households in FCT, Nassarawa

ore than 2000 households have received foodstuff and capacity building on sustainable nutrition services from the Emergency Food Relief Program implemented by the Institute of Human Virology, Nigeria (IHVN).

IHVN Director, Prevention, Care and Treatment, Dr. Helen Omuh revealed this at the close-out meeting of the program in Abuja, Nigeria. She said that the program is aimed at combating food insecurity and improving nutrition among at-risk families in 17 local government areas in the Federal Capital Territory and Nasarawa State.

She added that "households were carefully selected based on vulnerability assessments designed to address the urgent hunger crisis in vulnerable communities. The project focused on children aged 0-17 years and vulnerable caregivers, ensuring that the most food-insecure households received direct support. Throughout the initiative, 5,000 households were screened, with 2,500 of the most at-risk families selected across 12 Local Government Areas (LGAs) in Nasarawa and 5 LGAs in FCT."

Dr. Omuh further explained that "the program's impact extended beyond food distribution and incorporated community awareness campaigns, distribution of Information, Education, and Communication (IEC) materials to promote sustainable nutrition practices and training along side food demonstration sessions with 2,500 caregivers on meal planning, dietary diversity, and nutritious food preparation for long-term benefits to their families.

IHVN Program Manager, Dr. Victoria Igbinomwanhia, emphasized the program's comprehensive approach. "Beyond providing immediate relief, we empowered caregivers with the knowledge to sustain healthy nutrition habits.

EQUAL Researchers Call for better working Conditions for Midwives by Blessing Ukpabi and Luret Dakum

QUAL Researchers at the Institute of Human Virology Nigeria (IHVN) have called on the government and policymakers to improve the working conditions of midwives in conflict-affected areas to address poor maternal and newborn health outcomes in the country.

This call was made during a stakeholder meeting to disseminate research findings from Ensuring Quality Access and Learning for Mothers and their Newborns in Conflict Affected Context (EQUAL) Consortium research focused on midwifery participation, retention, and resilience in Yobe State.

The Principal Investigator of EQUAL at IHVN, Prof. Emilia Iwu stated that Nigeria has only six midwives per 10,000 people with the deficit worse in the North-East which has been affected by Boko Haram Insurgency. Prof. Iwu who was represented at the dissemination event by EQUAL Project Co-Investigator, Dr. Charity Maina said that "conflict has caused widespread economic hardship, food insecurity, displacement of residents and health workers, and severe disruption of healthcare delivery, including the destruction and closure of some health centers.

These factors have complicated efforts to recruit and retain midwives. Initial study findings from our qualitative study underscore the need for targeted support and intervention to improve midwifery retention and support in rural and hard-to-reach communities," she said.

The researchers highlighted the need for government and policymakers to strengthen midwifery education, improve working conditions through incentives, develop

management guidelines, address misconceptions, and enhance safety training. "The country needs to prioritize increased salaries, hazard allowances, secure transportation, and housing, and establish mentorship programs to continually support midwives in high-risk areas," Dr. Maina stressed

The researchers further noted the need for a clear career progression pathway for midwives and an extension of hospital postings with hands-on practice for thorough training to increase the confidence of midwives.

On security training, the researchers recommended training midwives on personal security, emergency protocols, psychological support, mental health check-ups, and peer support groups. At the meeting, IHVN Chief Operating Officer and Managing Director, Dr. Charles Olalekan Mensah, gave the opening remarks. He

welcomed participants and emphasized the importance of collaborative efforts in strengthening MNCH services. The dissemination event brought together representatives from international partners, the Foreign, Commonwealth & Development Office (FCDO), the International Rescue Committee (IRC), the Federal Ministry of Health, the National Primary Health Care Development Agency, the Yobe State Ministry of Health, amongst others to discuss research findings and share insights on the recommendations.

EQUAL is a multi-country research consortium generating evidence on effective approaches to deliver lifesaving maternal and newborn health care in countries affected by conflict. IHVN is participating in this research funded by UK Department for International Development (DFID) and led by the International Rescue Committee-IRC.

Lassa Fever: IHVN Strengthens Ondo State's Outbreak Response Capacity by Luret Dakum

o enhance the capacity of Ondo State to respond to lassa fever outbreaks, the International Research Center of Excellence (IRCE) at the Institute of Human Virology Nigeria (IHVN) has collaborated with Nigerian Center for Disease Control (NCDC) and the Ondo State Ministry of Health to strengthen the capacity of the Infectious Disease Hospital (IDH) at Akure for Lassa fever diagnosis and

management.

At the launch of the optimised laboratory in Ondo State, IHVN Epidemiology & Surveillance Manager for the SECURE-Nigeria Project, Mr. Saiki Adinoyi Musa explained that Ondo State has been a hotspot for Lassa fever outbreaks, contributing 32% of Nigeria's confirmed cases in 2023. Akure South Local Government Area recorded the highest number of cases,

underscoring the urgency of improved diagnostic and response measures.

"Previously, patient samples from IDH Akure had to be transported to the Federal Medical Centre (FMC) Owo, creating logistical challenges, delays in test results, and prolonged turnaround times that negatively impacted patient management. Recognizing these issues, the Ondo State Ministry of

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More than 380 Health Workers Train on Malaria

he Institute of Human Virology Nigeria (IHVN) has built the capacity of more than 380 healthcare workers in 18 Local Government Areas (LGA) in Ondo State on the diagnosis and treatment of malaria.

The two-day training sessions, which held concurrently at the Local Government Areas, equipped participants with skills to identify malaria symptoms, use diagnostic tools effectively for treatment of malaria, and properly document malaria cases within the Health Management Information System.

IHVN Ondo State Manager Dr Samuel Akingbesote explained that the training was part of the activities of the World Bank-funded Immunization and Malaria Progress by Accelerating Coverage and Transforming Services (IMPACT) project, which IHVN has been engaged to implement by the Ondo State Ministry of Health.

"Regular training of frontline healthcare workers ensures they remain updated on best practices, guidelines, and innovative approaches to delivering high-quality healthcare services. This training will bridge gaps in knowledge and practice observed during baseline facility assessment in the state. It also aligns with the goals of the IMPACT Ondo Project by fostering the delivery of comprehensive, patientcentered care and achieving

measurable improvements in health outcomes. With the conclusion of healthcare workers training, all is set for the provision of qualitative malaria care backed up with effective data management and efficient logistics system in the state," he said.

The Malaria Focal Person from Owo Local Government Area, Ms. Adejimi Omolade, said that the training provided updates on malaria case management. "We learned that in the first trimester, Artemisinin-based Combination Therapy (ACT) is safe for

malaria in pregnancy. We also learned about proper use of the rapid diagnostic kit. Mrs. Omolade added that the sessions also guided grievance redress, which will build a good relationship between health care workers and patients. Another participant, a nurse

from Ondo West Local Government Area, Ms. Ajayi Tolulope, said that the sessions were a time for learning and relearning malaria case management in children.

"I learned that a minimum dose of Sulphadoxine Pyrimethamine should be given to a pregnant woman as Intermittent Preventive Therapy in pregnancy. This should start

between 13 to 16 weeks of gestation as Directly Observed Therapy," she said.

Healthcare workers including doctors, nurses, community health extension workers and laboratory scientists from the state's 203 Basic Health Care Fund facilities participated in the malaria case management training. IMPACT project is targeted at promoting the uptake of malaria prevention and treatment services among women and children under five years in Ondo State.

Health (SMoH) advocated for the optimization of the existing molecular laboratory at IDH."

Mr. Saiki added that with support from IHVN implemented Strengthening Global Health Security Agenda in Nigeria (SECURE-Nigeria), the laboratory was optimized to conduct Lassa fever diagnostics, supportive tests, and enhance outbreak response mechanisms with funding from the United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention -Division for Global Health Protection (US-CDC

DGHP),

The facility received state-of-the-art equipment, including A BIOBASE Class III Biosafety Cabinet (Glove Box) and Hematology and Chemistry Auto Analyzers for supportive investigation. IHVN provided quality laboratory equipment commodities, alongside quality management training for laboratory scientists for accuracy and reliability in Lassa fever testing. We appreciate the government for providing an enabling environment for partners to collaborate with us."

At the event, The Permanent Secretary at one Ondo State Ministry of Health, Dr Adeniran Ikuomola said that the new laboratory and equipment would enable the state to detect cases of Lassa fever on time and in turn reduce the rate of fatality.

At the occasion, NCDC Director General Dr Jide Idris, who was represented by National Incident Manager for Lassa Fever Emergency Operation Center Dr Yetunde Abioye at the event, said more effort will be made to ensure the laboratory's continuous functionality.



IHVN Begins Construction of State-of-the-Art Learning and Development Center by Tong'ret Lot

n furtherance of its mission to enhance capacity building, research, and public health excellence, the Institute of Human Virology Nigeria (IHVN) has begun the construction of a five-story Learning and Development Center at its campus in Abuja.

The facility will contain cutting-edge amenities, including a 1,000-seat multipurpose hall, advanced training and meeting rooms, a modern library, and an e-learning center. It will also serve as a central hub for advanced training programs, promoting knowledge exchange and professional development for healthcare professionals both within Nigeria and internationally.IHVN Chief Executive Officer, Dr. Patrick Dakum noted that the center will be equipped to host both short-term and long-term training programs in collaboration with international institutions such as the University of Maryland and Rutgers University.

"We already have a number of institutions that are doing courses like Diploma and Masters in Public Health. We are now going to be looking at how we can also hone that in into a diploma, degree and post graduate degrees in implementation science," he said.

Mensah, said the Center is part of IHVN's long-term commitment to addressing knowledge gaps, mitigating brain drain, and strengthening Nigeria's public health workforce.

"This facility will play a pivotal role in training the next generation of healthcare professionals and researchers, ensuring that Nigeria continues to lead in public health interventions."

During the first technical meeting for the project, IHVN Director of Finance and Administration, Mr. Olu Alabi, urged Lubell Nigeria Ltd to adhere to project timelines and leverage lessons learned from construction of the IHVN seven-storey twin towers which they built. The Learning and Development Center is scheduled to be operational within 24 months, with full completion anticipated within 36 months.

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
